





Draft 2008 – 2009 Budget Highlights

- Special Levy projected to be up 3.6% or \$52.82 on a home assessed at \$122,000.
- # 6.3% funding increase (2008/09 Budget to 2007/08 Actual).
- ₹ 7% expenditure increase is driven by:
 - Costs associated with opening the new West Kildonan Collegiate and reopening Edmund Partridge Community School as a middle school (including 4.5 additional positions in custodial, Library Technician, and Support)
 - Cost associated with growing enrolment
 - 15 additional teaching positions devoted to class size reduction in the early years and the new high school physical education credits (net 12 positions – 3 in Administration are being reallocated to classroom)
 - 15 additional education assistant positions to serve special needs students
 - A \$40 per pupil increase in school budgets to reduce the cost to parents of their children's participation in school programs (Total - \$400,000)
 - Increase in costs of fuel, utilities, and maintenance (Total \$323,250)
 - Increase in Capital 'D' cost of Trades (Total \$232,000)


