




Fort Whyte Field Trip

ROOM 108 GRADE 4/5







MATH IN ROOM 100

In room 100 students are solving math problems in ways that promote collaboration and critical thinking.









RANDOM SMALL GROUPS

We work in random groups of two or three. This helps up stay focused on the task. It also helps us work with any member of our class. This makes our math class feel welcoming for anyone.



VERTICAL WRITING SPACE


Writing on our whiteboards helps everyone in our group see what we are thinking. It also lets us change our ideas, see our thinking process, and come up with many ideas.



ONE MARKER PER GROUP

In our groups only one person has a marker. It is their job to **record** the thinking. If you aren't holding a marker, you can share your thinking. This helps make sure everyone in the group knows what everyone is thinking.










Reminders

Pick Up and Drop Off Procedure

Student Drop Off/Pick Up: Thank you to everyone for supporting our new drop-off and pick-up routines. Please remember that the staff parking lot is staff only and cannot be used for pick up/drop off. The front parking loop is reserved for kindergarten and daycare families, as well as student who have mobility concerns. Please do not park/stop on left side of loop (fire lane) and by the intersection on Novara street. Parking passes are required to enter the loop. Please continue to park a minimum of one block away from the school to avoid traffic congestion.

Thank you for using the streets surrounding the perimeter of our school yard as a drop-off/pick-up location. Please be respectful of our community residences by not blocking or parking in driveways or using them to turn around. We thank you for your support!
