


#### Room 25 - Mrs. McDonald /Ms. Hunter

In Social Studies and English Language Arts we have been working on our 'Brave New World' project. Each student randomly chose a slip of paper that indicated their country's population, area, latitude, longitude, and wealth score. From there the students had to draw

their country and put it on our blank map to create our new

world.



We spent some time learning about more and less developed countries. We looked at their distribution around the world and events that have happened in the past that have contributed to unequal wealth distribution.

After that the students learned all about natural resources, what they are used for and where they are found in our world. The students then had to select what resources they wanted for their country. Finally, we create pie charts to show the distribution of various resources in our new world.

The students also created a number of maps for their country including a general map, population distribution, time zones, and climatic zone and vegetation zone. The students took that information and created physical models of their countries. Later we laid the countries on a grid on the floor to visualize our "Brave New World."


To tie this into English Language Arts the students have been creating graphic novels that explain how their country came to be.

We have been having a lot of fun and are looking forward to exploring the concepts of government systems, economic systems, laws, human rights and applying that knowledge to our Brave New World.



Mrs. Koshelanyk's grade 6 class has had a very exciting opportunity to learn how to sew and to create little 'stuffies' over the last few weeks. Carla Gunkel, mom to Kaitlyn in our class, has been volunteering to help teach the students different stiches using felt and embroidery floss. What began as 8 students interested in trying something new, turned into 20 students creating their own little creatures as well as the remaining, creating their own using another medium such as plasticine. Not only are the students sewing their stuffies, they are coming up with backstories for them

and then will use this information to write about them. Thank you so much to Carla for her time and expertise. We really appreciate the time and skill that you have brought to our class.



What are you looking at? Dissecting a Pig's Eye: Student Reflections.

In Science this term we have been working on our understanding of Optics. Learning about how the eye works through dissection is supporting our upcoming learning in the rest of the unit. We give a big thank you to Mr. Cieszecki for picking up the eyeballs and taking us through the process.




